Star Enlightened...Gems of the OES

While the instruction which takes place during the

initiatory work is without question one of the most significant of all of our efforts, it does not end with the initiation ceremony. Continual self-instruction using the knowledge gained is of primary importance to every member. Understanding the message of the Bible, using the tools and skill one has acquired, and working constantly toward the goal of

becoming a more worthwhile individual, these are the obligations of the Eastern Star. See Proverbs 1:7; Proverbs 15:5; Proverbs 4:13; Proverbs 8:33; Proverbs 12:1; Proverbs 16:22; Proverbs 24:32; 2 Timothy 3:16 **Esoteric things are taught only to a chosen few (***see Romans 9:29***)**. In the specific application to lodge work, it refers to those things which are transmitted to the candidate for degrees during initiation. The serious member who studiously applies himself to the work of the Order by searching for the secret, hidden and mysterious meaning of our symbolic teachings ever increases his understanding of our esoteric concepts.

Jewels of the Office – The jewels for the offices outside the Centrals Jewels, which are the Star Points, have their origin in the Foundation Stones of the New Jerusalem as described in the Revelation of St. John. The foundation stones, in turn, have their origin in the jewels described as adorning Aaron's breastplate (Aaron being the first high priest). These jewels all have associated meanings which are not necessarily the same as those symbolized by the Emblem of the Officer. It must be remembered that the Jewel of the Office represents the Office itself and that the Emblem represents the Officer. (p. 101)

Foundations Stones – When these stones were used in ancient symbolic writings, they became associated with certain virtues, sterling attributes, and spiritual refinements. In the work of the Eastern Star, each office was selected to represent certain such spiritual refinements as these are seen to be the foundations of the human spirit. The jewels of the five Star Points are referred to as the Central Jewels.

Having the glory of God: and her light was like unto a stone most precious, even like a jasper stone, clear as

crystal...And the building of the wall of it was of jasper: and the city was pure gold, like unto clear glass And the foundations of the wall of the city were garnished with all manner of precious stones. The first foundation was jasper; the second, sapphire; the third, a chalcedony; the fourth, an emerald; the fifth, sardonyx; the six, sardius; the seventh, chrysolyte; the eighth, beryl; the ninth, a topaz; the tenth, a chrysoprasus; the eleventh, a jacinth; the twelfth, an amethyst. Revelations 21:11 & Revelations 21:18-20 (1) Jasper (associated meaning perfection, prescience) is a precious stone which is described today as a dark kind of quartz. In ancient times, jasper was described as being a bright colored variety of chalcedony, very transparent and brilliant. It appears to have been very similar to the diamond in reflective properties and is said to have had a green tint. Because of its reflective qualities, it has an associated meaning of God's Glory. The first foundation stone and the Jewel of the Office of the Worthy Matron. See Revelations 4:3;

(2)Sapphire (faithfulness) – The sapphire is the second foundation stone and is the jewel of the office of the **Worthy Patron**. It is also known as the lapizlazuli and the azure stone. It is said to have the associated meaning of faithfulness towards all of the creatures of God. The sapphire is bluish in color and appears to have a covering of golden dust.

The <u>Associate Patron</u> lacks mention of a jewel, only that of an emblem, the Star within the Star. Opposite to the sun's rising in the East, it is symbolic of reflection. The woman and the man in the West, therefore, should reflect the dignity and authority of the East, also symbolic of the contemplative or thoughtful portion of life. When the Associate Patron was placed with the Associate Matron in the West, the reflective ability of the West was symbolically doubled. The Associate Patron in the West should symbolize to the member the necessity for doubling her own efforts to reflect the Light. See Isaiah 43:5 and Matthew 24:7

3)Chalcedony – Chalcedony is now applied to a transparent or translucent, more or less indistinctly crystallized form of quartz. It is usually white or gray and is used for engraving and ornamental carvings. This jewel represents of the Office of the **Associate Matron**. The Chalcedony is said to have the associated meaning of perfection in obedience to God.

- (4)Emerald (associated meaning eternal life), the fourth foundation stone, is a precious stone of green color and it is a variety of beryl. The emerald is the jewel of **Martha**. It is the birthstone of those born in May and is said to insure all kinds of domestic happiness. Another variety of the emerald is the jewel of the office of the Secretary. It has an association meaning of Deathlessness. See Exodus 28:18 and Revelations 4:3
- (5)Sardonyx is the fifth foundation stone and it is the jewel of the office of <u>Treasurer</u>. The sardonyx is a kind of chalcedony which is striped in three colors. It has an associated meaning of humility and purity.
- (6)Sardius is the sixth foundation stone and it is the Jewel of the Office of **Conductress**. It has an associated meaning of loyalty to Christ. It is multi-colored.
- (7)Chrysolyte, also known as serpentine, or as gold stone, is a silicate of magnesium and iron, which varies from a bright yellow to a green color. It represents of the office of the **Associate Conductress**. It is said to have an associated meaning of Heavenly Wisdom. It is the seventh foundation stone.
- (8)Beryl is a semi-precious stone of extreme hardness. Beryl is usually green or of a greenish hue, but, not infrequently, it is found is a clear crystal state. In this form (clear), Beryl represents of the office of the **Marshal**. It is said to have the associated meaning of the "Love of the Father." See Exodus 28:20
- (9)Olivene is the modern name for Topaz. This is assigned as the Jewel of the office of **Chaplain**. The true topaz is yellow, but the Olivene is of a definite green hue. It has an associated meaning of "Benevolence."
- (10)Chrysoprasus is one of the varieties of chalcedony. Usually it is a lovely apple green. It represents the office of the **Organist**. It is said to have an associated meaning of constant and cheerful endurance. It is the tenth foundation stone. See Revelations 21:20
- (11) Jacinth is described as being a precious stone which is orange to reddish, sometimes hyacinth, in color. In the early times the jacinth was a yellow stone which was tinged with blue or purple. It was similar to the cairngorm and amethyst. It has an associated meaning of "unchanged-ableness." It is the eleventh foundation stone. It is the Jewel of the office of the **Warder**.
- (12)Amethyst is a precious stone of a violet blue color. It is a kind of quartz. It is the twelfth foundation stone and is said to represent loyalty. The amethyst is also the birthstone of those born in February. It is the Jewel of the **Sentinel**.

The turquoise (associated meaning obedient loyalty), or the blue sapphire, is used to represent the character traits exemplified by <u>Adah</u>. The turquoise, representative of the virtues of **Adah** indicated that if we wish to make our lives a shining star, we must first master the virtues of the first Star Point, which is obedient loyalty. Topaz (associated meaning humble fulfillment of duty) — Two forms of Topaz are used as jewels of office. The bright yellow form is dedicated to the office of <u>Ruth</u>. The jewel has been associated with "rarity." Friendship such as enjoyed by Ruth and Naomi is a rare gem and well worth treasuring. The variety known as Olivene is dedicated to the office of the Chaplain.

Diamond (associated meaning purity) – The diamond is a very hard native substance consisting of crystallized carbon: when transparent and without flaw, it is regarded as the most valuable of all precious stones. The flawless, durable and valuable diamond is the jewel dedicated to the office of **Esther**. Esther's character was flawless, her standards and beliefs durable, and her life, as she lived it, of great value to her people. It is the Jewel of the office of Esther. It is said that the diamond means adamant and that it give the wearer great courage, endurance, and strength. See Jeremiah 17:1; Ezekiel 28:13

Ruby (associated meaning sacrifice) s the jewel dedicated to the office of **Electa**. Its deep red color is symbolic of warmth, love and sacrifice.
